# Course description:

Increasing internationalisation of national economies creates a specific pressure for national welfare states. As the support by social security systems is always in some way linked to the performance of national labour markets, a deterioration of economic performance caused by a decline in competitiveness threatens the maintenance of welfare schemes. For this reason, national democracies on the one hand have to shape economic and labour market policies successfully; on the other hand, they must also make sustainable arrangements to enable a continuous provision of welfare benefits. Thus, it is important that social policies are coherent with economic and labour market policies and do not run counter to these measures.

The suitability of social policy programs, however, is dependent inter alia on the specific institutional arrangements and market structures in which welfare benefits are provided. First, this leads to the question of why Western European welfare states show quite different institutional characteristics. Secondly, the question arises, what effects these different characteristics have on the economy and society of these countries. The third part of the seminar focuses on the adjustment problems of welfare states under the pressure of economic internationalisation. The questions on these topics will be addressed in the seminar on the basis of empirical and comparative studies.

**Enrolment:** Enrolment is possible in the first session of the course (October 10<sup>th</sup>, 2012).

**Grading:** Depending on the study program students hand in a paper and give a presentation or sit a written exam. Topics for the presentations will be discussed in the first session or in office hours. Regular attendance and

active course participation is required for all students. Each session has to be prepared with the basic reading material (see course schedule).
