Comparative Political Institutions: Bicameralism

Course description:

Most modern parliaments are bicameral in structure, i.e. they are composed of two chambers. This is virtually the only characteristic all bicameral parliaments have in common. Even in democratic political systems, second chambers differ dramatically with regard to their composition, to the way their members are selected, to their functions and completences and to the way bicameral conflicts are resolved. This seminar starts with an overview on historical and systematic reasons given for a bicameral parliamentary structure. We will then focus on a number of important country cases in detail. Finally we will consider the conditions under which second chambers in modern democracies are efficient and legitimate institutions.

Enrolment will take place in the first and second sessions. After that, no further enrolments will be accepted. Students are expected to:

- · attend sessions regularly
- · actively contribute to classroom discussions
- · complete assigned readings according to schedule
- Master students: to give oral presentations of assigned readings and hand in a research paper of 15-20 pages in length on 1 September 2013 at

Since most reading assignments are in English, this will be the general classroom language as well. Participants therefore must know enough English to be able to participate actively. Perfection is not required – you just need to understand and make yourself understood.
