**Description:** This lecture deepens students' knowledge in theories and methods of comparative political economy. It discusses analytical approaches and methods used in the comparative analysis of capitalism, with a special focus on the relationship between states and markets (or political and economic power) in the governance of labor and financial markets. We discuss classical authors of Comparative Political Economy (CPE), such as Smith and Marx, and newer concepts of labor and business power. Moreover, the lecture enlarges students' knowledge in the most important challenges political economies of today are confronted with such as financialization, public debt, skills, migration, labour-market dualization, and globalization. The lecture also intensively discusses the way quantitative as well as qualitative methods are applied in empirical studies to test hypotheses or to generate and refine existing theories. The course confronts the strengths and weaknesses of different analytical and theoretical frameworks with each other.

**Prerequisites:** A good knowledge of basic concepts and methods (quantitative as well as qualitative) of political science is required. Students should be able to understand academic papers written in English. Classroom language will be English. The written exam at the end of the course will be in English.

**Registration:** Registration takes place via KLIPS. I strongly recommend registration as this ensures that you may get information about ad hoc changes in the schedule.

**Obligatory reading:** All obligatory readings are made available on the ILIAS-website of the course. The written exam refers to the lecture as well as to the texts of the syllabus.
